Exploring Quadratos With Alexander John Shaia

"Quadratos is a door to a new paradigm within Christianity, and a fresh dialogue with world spirituality, psychology, the arts and even science." ~ Alexander John Shaia

Spiritual Book Group (SBG)

The SBG is beginning September and the fall season with a new book: Zealot by Dr. Reza Aslan. Dr. Aslan has a BA in Religious studies, a minor in biblical Greek, a Masters in Theology of World Religions from Harvard, and a PhD in the Sociology of Religions from the University of California Santa Barbara.

About his book Zealot from Publishers Weekly: "The person and work of Jesus of Nazareth has been a topic of constant interest since he lived and died some 2,000 years ago. Much speculation about who he was and what he taught has led to confusion and doubt. Aslan, who authored the much acclaimed No God But God: The Origins, Evolution, and Future of Islam, offers a compelling argument for a fresh look at the Nazarene, focusing on how Jesus the man evolved into Jesus the Christ. Approaching the subject from a purely academic perspective, the author parts an important curtain that has long hidden from view the man Jesus, who is every bit as compelling, charismatic, and praiseworthy as Jesus the Christ. Carefully comparing extra-biblical historical records with the New Testament accounts, Aslan develops a convincing and coherent story of how the Christian church, and in particular Paul, reshaped Christianity's essence, obscuring the very real man who was Jesus of Nazareth. Compulsively readable and written at a popular level, this superb work is highly recommended."

Dr. Aslan was the keynote speaker and preacher at the annual UCC Conference for NY that Art and Tracy, Mary and Bill Cuddeback and Janet attended, and he was an excellent and interesting speaker.

Genius in The Shadows: a Biography of Leo Szilard, The Man Behind the Bomb, by William Lanouette. A scientist of the first order, but overshadowed by others associated with the atomic bomb—Einstein, Oppenheimer, and Teller, Szilard was as great a contributor as they were to those efforts during World War II, and became far more active in the control of nuclear arms after the war than many of them. 530.092 LANO

The People's Bible: the Remarkable History of the King James Version, by Derek Wilson and Diarmaid MacCullogh. In response to the complaints of the Puritans, King James I of England commissioned a new translation of the Bible, readable by everyone in his kingdom and available in every church in the realm. <u>Christian Education</u> Why Church Matters to Kids

Now that school is out and the kids are getting so much free time to do what they want to do, see what they want to see and take in as much time as they possibly can outdoors, we want to offer up some spiritual food for thought as we gear up for the new church year.

The following are some reasons why church matters to kids:

- 1) The church matters (deeply) to Jesus.

While it is day by Toní Rorapaugh

We must work the works of Him who sent Me as long as it is day; night is coming when no one can work. John 9:4

It was a beautiful day. At about 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 25, my husband and I drove to Otsiningo Park and registered for the Walk to Defeat ALS. If you know anything about Yankee baseball player Lou Gehrig, you probably know him as the most famous person ever stricken with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis--ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's Disease. We were there to support our friend, Ken, and his family. We were wearing our special t-shirts, which bore Ken's picture and our group name: Kenny's Team.

Just prior to the official start of the Walk, the organizer told us that there were over 600 of us there that morning, up from about 450 the previous year. As I stood there on the path, I saw the colorful t-shirts of many other teams. Some people also sported white signs that bore the name of the person they were walking in honor of or in memory of, names like Nancy, Bernie, Joe, Marc, Denise, and Ken. A man standing in front of me wore two signs; he was walking in memory of one person and in honor of another.

As we began the Walk, we passed a sign telling us that since Lou Gehrig's diagnosis in 1939, over 7 million more people have been diagnosed with ALS. Ken and Denise were both there, leading their teams from their wheelchairs, but many others are unable to get out--perhaps they lack the kinds of mobility that these two can manage. I tried to imagine what it must be like to be unable to move at all, except to breathe, to be confined to a bed, perhaps to struggle to breathe. This annual Walk--like the ice water challenge you may have heard of--helps to raise funds, in part, so that ALS patients have access to the technology that will allow them to survive until research finds a cure; it also helps fund that research.

After the Walk, we were treated to pizza and snacks. Out of my small bag of sour cream and onion potato chips I pulled a heart-shaped chip. It was not the first heart-shaped chip I'd seen, so I didn't mention it. It was part way into my mouth before I noticed the small hole in it. A heart-shaped chip with a hole in it--oh, that's so corny! Didn't mention that, either.

But I did think that the holey chip was a kind of symbol, and I couldn't help but think about my friend's discovery of a tape her late husband had made years ago, that she had never heard, and just discovered recently. On the tape he sings of how time is running out, and how the Lord has charged us to do God's works before night comes, when no one can work.

It was a beautiful day in Otsiningo Park, and there we were, doing the works we were given to do while it was day.
