Pastor's Perspective -

This is arguable, of course, but it is widely believed that the most ignored of all the sayings of Jesus is when he tells us not to judge. Yet, there it is, right in the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 7:1, followed by the story of the speck in their eye, and a log in your own.

On the face of it, it seems ridiculous. How could we possibly go through life without judging? I have in mind the hundred or so decisions that have gone into the entrance and hallway renovation at First Congregational Church. This wallpaper or that? How about the carpeting? Those decisions were all the result of considered

judgment. It strikes me as impossible to avoid. And yet, I don't think we can dismiss Jesus' admonition so easily.

Two thoughts to share in defense of Jesus advice not to judge...

The first has to do with simple humility. Even though we may feel like we are the most intelligent person around, and our thoughts are the best ones compared to others, and our experience on most matters is the most relevant, and our judgment has always been the most sound, we also know deep inside that is absurd. We actually only have our perspective, our tiny slice of perception which is never comprehensive. Jane Goodall, the primatologist, put it beautifully.

"There are many windows through which we can look out into the world, searching for meaning ...

...Most of us, when we ponder on the meaning of our existence, peer through but one of these windows onto the world. And even that one is often misted over by the breath of our finite humanity.

We clear a tiny peephole and stare through. No wonder we are confused by the tiny fraction of a whole that we see.

It is, after all, like trying to comprehend the panorama of the desert or the sea through a rolled-up newspaper."

There is a second, equally good reason not to judge. This has to do with something we all have experienced. Something happens that we then judge as bad, and we find out later that it was a good thing. There are a thousand examples. We initially judged it bad because of reason #1, our perspective was too small, our knowledge too limited, and we weren't able to foresee the way it could result in good.

"Do not judge!" has some stiff competition for being ignored. "Don't cast the first stone" comes to mind, as well as, "Don't worry about tomorrow". But despite the fact we need to make daily decisions, not judging is healthy advice. A sense of humility befits us. And when we haven't made up our mind about a person or an event, it opens us up to seeing from a wider, and perhaps more godly, perspective. Happy Thanksgiving to you and yours,

"Doctor" Joe Izzo

Joseph Izzo is a fifth-year graduate student at Binghamton University in the chemistry department, and frequent attendee at FCC. On November 16^t, he will be defending his dissertation thesis entitled: *Kinetic Isotope Effects and Density Functional Theory as Tools for Mechanistic Elucidation of Catalytic Reactions in Organic Chemistry: Secondary Amine catalysis, Non-covalent Organocatalysis, and Transition Metal Catalysis.*

The defense will be at 11:00 AM, in room 2004 of the University's new "Smart Energy Building" (25 Murray Hill Rd.) and is open to the public. The defense will consist of a 30-45 minute presentation highlighting some of the work Joe has done at BU. After a short Q&A session, the audience will be asked to leave, and Joe will face questions from a committee of professors. Upon the completion and passing of this defense, he will spend the next two months continuing to work and live in Binghamton. Toward the end of January, Joe will be leaving Binghamton, New York, and the United States, to fulfill a post-doctoral position in the lab of Professor Karl Anker Jørgensen at Aarhus University, in Aarhus, Denmark. In this research position, Joe will continue his work in organic chemistry. After one-three years working in Denmark, he hopes to return to the US and serve as a professor at a university. He is sad to leave the friends and church family that he established in Binghamton, but is excited for this chance to explore the world and build his scientific career.

During worship on November 18, the congregation will participate in a "blessing ceremony" for Joe.

Armistice Day - Veterans' Day

November 11 will mark the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I, "the war to end all wars"! Because the fighting was happening all around the world, when the armistice was agreed to, there was concern that everyone stop fighting at the same time. Neighbors in Need

In order to justify himself the man asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor"? In reply Jesus told the story of the Good Samaritan. The United Church of Christ holds four special offerings each year. One is "Neighbors in Need" where like the Good Samaritan, we can help neighbors we don't even know. Money collected is used by the Justice and Witness of the UCC. One third goes to the Council for American Indian Ministry, and two thirds is used for grants to churches working for social issues. Items like programs to help the LGBTQ community, immigrants, and projects for the poor in third world countries. This year special consideration is being given to serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.
